

We design prevention and awareness measures to equip children, parents, caregivers, educators, families of origin and community members with the knowledge and skills necessary to protect children against dangerous, risky, violent and abusive situations. A strong focus is put on preventing violence against children, including gender-based violence, sexual coercion, abuse and exploitation, abusive disciplinary practices, and other forms of discrimination.

Quality care and Child Safeguarding continue to be integral parts of our day-to-day work. We continue to strengthen our procedures and processes to ensure all children and participants are safe within a conducive environment. Child Safeguarding (CS) case management has been strengthened with the introduction of Standard Operating Procedures (SoP) to effectively and efficiently manage safeguarding incidents.

This ensured greater understanding of issues related to sexual and genderbased violence at the click of a button. Moreover, we build capacity in sexual and reproductive health in addition to positive parenting and discipline for Caregivers to increase the rate of prevention of CS case in line with the findings of the risk assessment

Training of project implementing partners, SOS children and youth's families of origin, and service providers on the child protection policy and procedures. The training strengthens the capacities of persons who directly or indirectly work with the organisation to ensure protection and quality data on child protection and its reporting procedures. This includes families of origin of programme participants, service providers and co-workers. This is to ensure increase knowledge on our child protection policy and procedures by all stakeholders and partners.

To consolidate initial SRHR interventions, scale up initiatives and to introduce new preventive, mitigating and resilience measures. A Smart communication platform was established (WhatsApp Chatbot and Smart Broadcast) for children and youth, SOS Mothers and Family Assistants in both locations by SOS CV Implementing partner – The Web Way in November 2022. More than 150 users access these platforms from November and December 2022. We will continue to improve our system and procedures by innovating ways to ensure everyone is protected and has access to support.

# A journey of a thousand miles begins with just a step!

### Isatou's Story -Trainer

My **Trauma-Informed Practices Training** began when we were nominated to attend a mental health program organized by management in July 2022. I was so excited because mental health has always been a topic I was interested in. However, this journey shaped me to have a broader view of Mental Health, I learned that "an empty lantern provides no light and selfcare is the fuel that allows your light to shine."

This is one of the quotes that I fell in love with the most. One might wonder why the quote above became one of my favorites during this training, well, it is because of few reasons. Firstly, before attending the Mental

Health sessions, I had no idea what self-care truly meant. It was a phrase that almost everyone would use and I became an advocate of self-care. On many ocassions, I missed lunch breaks, because I loved to do things well; but I failed to learn new skills. The Trauma-Informed Practices training helped my colleagues and me to understand what self-care truly meant - it is not about "fanciness! Self-care meant eating on time, taking regular breaks, interacting with colleagues, learning new things, etc. It is also asking yourself what you need and following through on the honest answer. I learned how self-care can help me love and support those around me, how self-care can help me wear someone's shoes and feel their situation and be able to give them back their shoes compassionately but most importantly how self-care and well-being can help the organization and its staff put on their trauma lens. I learned how some people experience trauma at different levels. How this mean death (not physical death) but one that could be a social death, psychological death, or emotional death. This made me reflect on how I had advocated for self-care but I was not really practicing what I was preaching. From lesson learned started to take regular breaks, and eat on time and I learned new skills. Today I am happy to be practicing self-care and urge my colleagues to experience self-care for a happy and healthy workplace. The training prepared me to be a trainer and I am thrilled to share the knowledge that I learned with other SOS colleagues and beneficiaries.



Earlier in 2022, the National Association of SOS Children's Villages in The Gambia had a five days workshop to develop a National Strategy for 2023-2027. The five days event brought together programme participants and key stakeholders from SOS Children's Villages Regional Offices for West Central and North Africa. 

Children lacking parental care has slightly increased according to the SAC - IN The Gambia. Despite the fact that children are valued in The Gambia, some of them lack parental care". The concept of 'children without parental care' refers to all children not in the care of at least one of their parents, for whatever reason and under whatever circumstances.

The situation of these children is a serious concern because they do not enjoy parental care, as requires by the Covention on the rights of children (CRC). They are therefore deprived of the opportunity to "grow up in a supportive, caring and nurturing family environment". Some of them are exposed to risks

of abuse, violence, and exploitation. Meanwhile, the governing principles of alternative care established by the UN "Guidelines for alternative care" stipulate that "children living without their


parents, or outside of a family environment, should be exception and a measure of last determined by judicial resort, authorities for the best interest of the child. Earlier this year, SOS Children's Villages in The Gambia with partners including the Ministries Gender, Children and Social Welfare, Child Justice and agencies Protection and organisation held a two days concultative session with the aim to discuss the situation of children in need of care and look deeply into the introduction of new care options in

'My earning is not much though, but what I want is to earn a lot and save for tomorrow.

All the earning I have goes to feeding, rent, and my children's education that the issue. I sell ice at the school and at the local mall which I started recently.

Now I am lucky to be part of the SOS Children Villages Project which has helped me a lot. Before I joined the project, I was in a very difficult situation.

When I sell today I could not sell the

next day because the profit I made was not able to support me for the next day for me to buy the necessary items I need for the next day.

So, through the BMZ Project, I was able to sell again, pay my rent, pay my children's school fees, and many more for myself. I want my business to grow to a level that I will not rent again and support my family. My family is not strong, they are suffering and all of them depend on me. everyone comes to me for everything. So, whatever I have, I try to support them. If I don't havei tell them

I pray for my business to become stronger and stronger to the level of having my own company just to see that my children become successful. I sell local juice (Baobab, coffee, mint, strawberry, banana, and Kabba). Some time ago, my business was not doing well and was challenging.

You will not expect me to sought out my need with the little money I make from my business, I had to pay rent, school fees, and other family issues so it was challenging, but I tried to manage. At some point, I only had to sell only

baobab and coffee juice because of the little money I had. So, when the BMZ Project came, I was able to increase my sales and prepare a lot of varieties to sell.

The only challenge is facing is the lack of electricity. This is a very big challenge for my business. Sometimes I lost all that I have prepared due to the ice, Now I am seeking help to have a solar fridge to ease the burden. My ice is in high demand, clients come from far away like the capital city to buy my ice. This makes me happy. I put the juice into plastic bags and sell them. In fact, the process takes time. I can start from the morning till at night.

I want a solar fridge it will help me a lot in my business because my family depends on this. My family members also help me in my business. I cannot do it alone.

Sometimes when clients come to buy ice and realize that there is no ice, they get angry citing that they come along and there is no ice. This makes me sad and shame because I want anytime if someone comes to buy, the s available. I want my clients to be happy

There was a time when we go out our clothes all smells a lot of smoke. When we go out people will know that we are from the dumpsite. All the house will be on smoke, you cannot leave your food without covering it. Sometimes we go to our friend's houses. Our children get sick. Sometimes the smell is so bad that you cannot sit outside. Sometimes if the smoke starts, our children do not go to school, and sometimes they get sick, we go get them medicine.

When the smoke enters the house, we are the ones who get water and put the fire off. Sometimes before the fire services come, we are already tired. Sometimes at midnight, the fire from the dumpsite starts. We all get up and try to save our families because the fuel station near the dumpsite can make it worst. They have stolen a lot of our belongings when we are not around due to the fires at the dump site.

When the SOS Children's Villages project came we could not believe it. Now whenever we have a program we don't have to be ashamed anymore. But before when you 'have a program here, is the time the dumpsite is set on fire. All our guests will leave due to the smoke from the dump site. Sometimes our family members call us and ask us about the situation at the dump site. It has been a while since we did not see any smoke or encountered a bad smell or see flies since the project began.

Before I joined the SOS Project, I was not have profit in my business. But after the training I got from the project on Business plan and Management, SOS Children' Villages helped me venture into other business such as charcoal making and many other things. They did not stop there, they also taught us how to care for our children and their rights, eg right to food, health and education. We learnt all that during the project.

What made happy about the project is that, the support given to us. If I was not supported, today I will not reach here, even if I wanted it to be at this stage whithout the support of SOS Children's Villages I will not be here. Everything is about money and if you don't have that you will not achieve your dreams.

I want my business to grow to a level that I have my own company. Today all my children go to school, there was a time I could not pay my children school fees because I was not having money. But since the business started I enrolled them him in school (the eldest son) now he is in grade 10. Currently he also engage in appreticship and luckily if he finish his education, our situation might improve.

I was not educated, so i will love my children to be educated, so i have to get up and work

to make sure they have the education that you never had. So that tomorrow they when they have their families, they will support them.

My whish for my children is that , the way I suffered , I don't want my children to go through it. One of my boys is currently into auto mechanic and the other one is into football the elderest. They are all brilliant and if I have help they will all be successful.

My children motivates me, if I don't have children I will not be active like this. But when I remember my children with the hope they have in me it makes me active. Even if am sick, I always remember how will my children go to school or eat. so this keeps me moving. If I don't go to sell, my children will help me sell because I thought them also how to go about it. So from the sales money, I pay rent, pay the electricity bill, and their school lunch.

'My wish is to have a solar fridge and my own company.

If I have it, it will solve all my problems. I will help all my children and also my family members who need help.

So that I can break the cycle of proverty'.

Am used to the school children they call me aunty all the time. Sometimes I even give them ice, sometimes if they tell me they don't have lunch, I give them or some will ask for credit. Me too I have children and the knows the importance of providing for them. Them saying 'aunty aunty sell me, sell me makes me happy'.

Jankey was enrolled at the SOS Children's Villages in The Gambia Sustainable Waste Management to Reduce Child Rights Violation at the Bakoteh Dumpsite. The Project was aimed at Children and families in the neighborhood of Bakoteh dump site are protected from health, environmental, economic risks and violations of Children's rights which includes Jankey's families. the Sustainable Waste Management to Reduce Child Rights Violation Project was a two years project from November 1st, 2020 -2022 (26 months), with a cost of 42 Million GMD (Gambia Dalasis).

Funded by the German Federal Ministry of Economic Cooperation & Development (BMZ), SOS Children's Villages Hermann Gmeiner Fonds Deutschland (HGFD), and Kanifing Municipal Council (KMC) and implemented by SOS Children's Villages in The Gambia. The project has directly benefited 200 families (including 1000 children and 50 youths) 100 representatives of local partners and decision makers (City Administration, Dumpsite Management, NGOs, and Community-Based Organisations), and indirectly benefited 10,000 people targeted through mass sensitization/awareness creation.




## CONTRIBUTE TO CHANGE LIFE SPONSOR A FAMILY HOUSE
